To create a hold

To create a bold entrance garden to offset the uninteresting façade of an older home.

the SOLUTION dominants

A dominant focal point anchors the attention in the foreground, and defines the garden completes the picture.

he entrance garden of any home helps to shape the all-important first impression, heralds a welcome and engages visitors as they

arrive.

BACK TO BASICS

In this month's garden, a pleasing geometric space was available in which the owners wanted a striking focal point with an abundance of seasonal colour incorporated into an interesting ground pattern. They also wanted a measure of privacy from the street without cluttering the space or making it unsafe by providing potential hideaways for intruders.


The ground pattern was created around a small gravel circle, which houses a bold, large urn. Curved pathways of stepping blocks lead into and out of the gravel circle, providing comfortable access from the front gate to the front door. The direct line of sight to the front door is broken and the urn retains the attention in the garden space, diverting the view away from unremarkable clinker brick walls.













in soothing waves, using the ever-faithfully flowering statice (Limonium perezii) and golden-yellow Acorus grasses. White agapanthus tucks around the central planting on the outer edges, completing a highly successful colour trio of white, blue and yellow.

Two smaller planting blocks to the side house two pots in a similar style to the central urn, each planted with a Syzygium lollipop to create height. The pots nestle in a block of orange day lilies (Hemerocallis sp.) to accentuate them and are in turn framed by a row of dwarf mondo grass (Ophiopogon japonicus 'Kyoto'). Cheerful violas at the feet of the lollipops have been chosen within the same colour spectrum as the central planting
